

#### NOVEMBER – THE MONTH IN WHICH WE REMEMBER THE DECEASED

November is traditionally the month in which we give more attention to the remembrance of the deceased. Christians do so in a unique way based on what is central in our faith: the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

In our two parishes, we have a tradition of leaving our **Book of Life** at the front of the church for the month of November. The **Book of Life** contains the names of deceased parishioners and relatives. Some additional pages are provided at the back of the book if anyone wants to add names. It is our way of expressing our faith that the dead find peace with God and will be raised to life when the Lord Jesus comes in glory.

The Book is placed next to the Easter Candle which speaks of the ultimate victory of life over death, of light over darkness, in the dead and risen Jesus. We are called to share in that victory. Next weekend, our parishes will have a special remembrance for the deceased from the past year.

# Father Albanus' Reflections on the Sunday Liturgy Merciful Love and Openness Conquer Sins

Today's readings speak of the benevolent and forgiving mercy of God for sinners and the response of repentance and conversion expected from us. The first reading from the book of Wisdom presents a radical image of God the Father. He is not like a great accountant who keeps exact records of all our sins. He is rather a lover of life. He abhors nothing He has made and conserves all in a spirit of mercy. He "overlooks people's sins so that they may repent." The way He forgives is different from our way. While we demand repentance first to forgive, God first overlooks our sins and is not transfixed by them, hoping that this generous gesture will lead sinners to repentance. The Psalmist also tells us that the Lord is good to all, and His compassion is over all that He has made. God's attitude to sinners seen in the first reading is also evident in the Gospel which presents the story of the instantaneous conversion of the tax-collector Zacchaeus.

Jesus encountered Zacchaeus as he passed through Jericho. Jericho, a wealthy city and an important trade centre, was an ideal spot for an ambitious tax-collector. Being a rich tax collector would definitely have made Zacchaeus an obvious target for the hatred of his fellow Jews. Tax collectors were put in the same category of sinners with thieves, murderers and prostitutes and regarded as traitors by their own people due to their employment by the Roman government. Thus, one should expect Zacchaeus to be lonely and isolated. The Gospel however describes how Jesus recognized Zacchaeus for exactly what he was, a lost sinner in need of a Savior, and how God's grace worked in him to lead him from idle curiosity to repentance, conversion and restitution. The episode emphasizes the fact that such a conversion can only result from a person's fully receiving the love, acceptance and grace offered to everyone one by a merciful Lord.

To be noted is that Jesus initiates the contact and calls Zacchaeus by name and does not shout condemnation at him. He does not exact repentance from the tax collector; He rather overlooks his sins and invites him to come down from the tree for "I must stay at your house today." The people are enraged because of His gesture but Jesus is more interested in the outcast than the outraged. While the people are transfixed by the tax-collector's sins, Jesus sees beyond the sins to the person that Zacchaeus can become. The Lord does not give up on any of us. Jesus' generous gesture yields a good result: Zacchaeus repents and makes public amends for his sins. The sequence in this graceful encounter is very important. Jesus does not demand repentance from Zacchaeus before eating with him. The Lord's attitude in welcoming sinners and eating with them gives them the opportunity to repent. Repentance comes in an atmosphere of acceptance. This is also our story with God.

We need to accept God's divine invitations to repentance like Zacchaeus. As sinners to a greater or lesser degree, Jesus is inviting us to a total conversion today. He loves us in spite of our ugly thoughts, broken promises, sullied ideals, lack of prayer and Faith, resentments and lusts. His Gospel excludes no one. The kingdom of God is open to all, the rich and the poor. Though the full challenge of Gospel is difficult for the rich to accept, we cannot write them off. The rich need to say yes to God with the establishment of justice with respect to their wealth. Through generosity, they can move from our small and feeble faith to a greater and more powerful faith, just as Zacchaeus did. We have to be both financially and spiritually generous.

We should learn to love others in spite of their sins. Parents and teachers need to accept children lovingly, without first setting up standards of behaviour as conditions for being loved. Husband and wife may have qualities that irritate each other; but they should not withhold love from each other. Nor should they withhold their love from a rebellious teenager making stupid and even dangerous choices because of immaturity and peer-pressure. How would we respond to Jesus demand "I must be in your house today?"
