

Monthly Prayer Intentions of Our Bishop August 5, 2018

"Let us pray for people who are evicted and/or driven away from their country; those who are under threat and must leave hurriedly their land at the risk of their life; those who are taken advantage of by large multinational companies at the expense of local peasants, so that human dignity will be respected for all."

<u>Social Reflection</u>: "The practice of forced eviction constitutes a gross violation of human rights, in particular the right to adequate housing" (Commission on Human Rights, Resolution 1993/77). Every year, millions of people around the world are forcibly evicted from their homes and their land, often leaving them living in extreme poverty and destitution. Forced evictions can be severely traumatic and set back even further the lives of those that are already marginalized or vulnerable in society. Moreover, forced evictions violate a wide range of internationally recognized human rights, including the rights to adequate housing, food, water, health, education, work, security of the person, freedom from cruel, inhuman and degrading treatment, and freedom of movement."

"Forced eviction occurs throughout the world, in developing and developed countries alike, in the context of development or emergencies and reconstruction. Accelerating urbanization, climate change and globalization, financial and other global crises have contributed to making forced evictions even more acute and complex." Close to us, Aboriginal people are victims of such practice.

An Answer for our Faith: As Christians, are we sensitive to these moves and their impact on the life and dignity of populations affected by these practices? How do welcome people who are coming to our country for similar reasons? Do we try to get informed of the impact of these actions to stress them to our political leaders and ask them to take action so they put an end to these dehumanizing practices? Aboriginal people living in our country claim their lands as "sacred lands" to take care of all the time; do we encourage them?

<u>Questions I ask myself:</u> Aug 5: What is our responsibility with regards to heads of states who make decisions detrimental to the dignity of our human brothers and sisters? Aug 12: Many migrants drown on their way to Europe or other areas. Am I responsive to such reality? I take time to raise awareness around me on this unacceptable situation experienced by migrants.

The Bread from Heaven

Today's readings challenge us to trust in the providence of God who is loving and caring. They also urge us to hunger and thirst for the bread of eternal life. Only God can satisfy our various forms of spiritual hunger. The **first reading** from the Book of Exodus teaches us to see in all that happens with the guiding hand of Gods providence that leads us through life. It shows how God satisfied the hunger of His chosen people in the desert by giving them manna and quail. The Israelites after the first enthusiasm for their regained freedom began to feel a sentimental yearning for Egypt. Hunger made them dream of an abundance of food that they could seldom have tasted there. God, instead of anger, gave them more signs of His love. He however imposed restrictions for the collection of manna; that which reminded them to acknowledge humbly their total dependence on God and to trust that He will always provide for what they needed. As Christians, we sometimes feel like going back to our old life and habits. But God will continue to be closer to us as He was to Israel.

St. Paul, in the **second reading**, also deals with the same issue of desire to go back to the old self. He advises the Christians not to forget they are now new creatures. He uses the images of the 'old man' and the 'new man' to explain that their acceptance of Jesus as the real source of our life and the nourishment of our souls effects a total transformation in us. The old man is the life of sin, the avidity and miseries of one who is seduced by his deceitful passions while the new man is the new creature born from the waters of baptism and transformed in his/her moral behavior. Christians, he advises, should avoid succumbing to the temptation of going back to the old life.

In the **Gospel**, Jesus makes a unique and bold claim, "I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty." After the multiplication of loaves (last Sunday), Jesus was misunderstood as the people wanted to make Him king. But He slips away to the mountain to gain time and more probably, to pray. Today's Gospel shows the crowd looking for Him for reason we can easily guess – to be fed again. He rather offer them the Bread from heaven, Bread that nourishes for eternal life, Bread available to people who have faith in Him. When He invited them some accepted the nourishment, but others turned away, disappointed because Jesus' challenge required a commitment that they were unwilling to make. Does our longing for God hinge only on the hope to get some favors or some extraordinary miracle? Faith in Jesus cannot be reduced to a set of reasons. It requires joining one's life to His and choosing to give it up with Him for the brothers and sisters. The only bread that can satisfy the need for happiness and peace is the Word of Christ. But this Word cannot be effective if it remains something of the past. It must be assimilated by us day after day, like the bread which, once eaten, becomes part of the person. **Happy Sunday!**
