Jesus answered him: "it is written..." (Gospel). To listen carefully to that Word, I refer to Living with Christ to read over and meditate on these texts

Reflections on the Sunday Liturgy (from the Synodal Process)

When we speak, we express ourselves, we put ourselves out there, we establish relationships, we launch movements. When we speak, we explain ourselves, we confide, we give advice, encouragement, consolation. When we speak, we rejoice, we exalt, we laugh, we celebrate.

God also speaks – because God wants to express Himself, to enter into a relationship with us and to launch a movement in the world.

God explains Himself, He confides in us, He gives us advice, He encourages us, He consoles us. God rejoices in His Word, He exalts Himself, He laughs, He celebrates.

The wonderful thing about God is that His Word is not only in words but in a person, His Son Jesus, His living Word.

Gathered in Christian community, we come to listen to Jesus, we come to receive the Word of God. Here, Jesus Himself speaks to us. In today's gospel, He reminds us of how He foiled the tempter by remembering the words of God in the Old Testament. He invites us to imitate Him by also drawing on the Bible to find the light and strength necessary to remain faithful on the path of life.

In the second reading, through Saint Paul, He reminds us that He is close to us, in our very heart. He, the living word, inspires our words of faith, hope and love.

We need to listen to the people around us - but that is not enough. We are invited to respond to God's invitation to listen to His Beloved Son, whether we are gathered in community or alone in our homes.

God wants to talk to us. What a gift for us!

Lenten Celebrations: As announced by our Archbishop, the second phase of our synodal process will take place in two stages: A *first phase* during Lent to allow us to be challenged by the Word of God and to answer Him in prayer; a **second phase** between Easter and Pentecost to discuss the issues that arose during the first phase.

During Lent, we will deepen a conviction that emerged during the first phase which can be summarized as follows: "The Christian Community Helps Us to Grow in Our Relationship with Christ."

You will also notice liturgical changes in the Words of Welcome, Penitential Rite and the Rite of Dismissal.

<u>Our Lenten Journey:</u> Lent is meant to get us in shape to celebrate the central mystery of our faith: **The death and** *resurrection of Jesus Christ*. During Lent, the liturgy prepares us for Easter as we recall our baptism and do penance in preparation for the greatest feast of the year. We can mark the journey with the traditional Lenten practices of prayer, fasting and almsgiving.

| Fasting | During Lent, we could refrain from some food, from a drink, from a party, from a video as a gesture of solidarity with those who have no choice in these matters, for the simple reason that they do not have them.
