

## Fr. Albanus' Reflections on the Sunday Liturgy

## The Cost of Discipleship

Today's readings challenge us to be true disciples by embracing the cost of true discipleship. True discipleship demands total commitment to the will of God, putting God first in our lives. The Book of Wisdom (the first reading) instructs us to ask for the gift of discernment and wisdom so that we may do the will of God as true disciples. God is the only one who can grant wisdom and give it gratuitously. The human alone cannot find what the Lord's will is because our reasoning is fuzzy and uncertain. Our mind is weighed down by our corruptible body. It is hardly surprising that we have trouble figuring out the intentions of God when we have so much trouble figuring out the things of this world. We cannot decide freely and wisely; we cannot keep a straight course if God does not send us His light from above, if He does not grant us His wisdom. The **second reading** is from letter of St. Paul to Philemon. It is a beautiful example of the practice of love, forgiveness and detachment from material goods by Paul. As a responsible apostle and zealous disciple of Christ, Paul had to renounce the service of his new helper, Onesimus. He tries to figure out how to send this runaway slave back to his master Philemon and at the same time expresses his hope that Philemon will receive him not as a slave, but as "a beloved brother." As a prisoner, St. Paul puts his love to work in the service of someone else in bondage. An excellent example of true discipleship!

In the **Gospel**, we are asked to count the cost of being a disciple and follower of Christ, because the cost is high. Jesus does not want to deceive anybody about the difficulty of being His disciple. He is setting down the very hard conditions and demands. Those who want to be His disciples have to work out for themselves if they are equal to the demands of discipleship. Hence, they have to figure out the cost of discipleship, and then consider whether they have the resources to meet that cost. These demands are unacceptable by one who wants to be led by human reasoning. They can be understood and accepted only by one who has been granted the "wisdom from above", as we read in the first reading. True Christian discipleship requires one to "renounce" both earthly possessions and possessions of the heart (one's relationships). A disciple should therefore renounce too much attachment to family; give priority to God and His commandments. She/he should break off the excessive attachment to possessions by leading a detached life, willingly sharing one's blessing with others. She/he should accept the hard consequences of discipleship which include daily sacrificial services done for others and even the giving of one's life for them.

To drive the point home, Jesus uses two parables. One intending to build a tower would "first sit down and estimate the cost". If he started without finishing, the sum of his achievement would be a monument to his own stupidity. In the same way the king who discovers that his forces are outnumbered would "first sit down and consider" whether the opposing arithmetic is too heavy. The advice is clear in both instances: take the time; sit down; look at the demands; figure out whether you can honestly meet them. There is the need to think long and hard about Christian discipleship before a decision is made. There is no room for casual followers! Jesus does not want people rushing headlong into instant commitment while ignoring the cost and their own capabilities. Discipleship involves having no security other than total commitment to Jesus. Jesus calls His disciples away from the primacy of the family because discipleship means new and all-consuming loyalty. It means following in the "broad shadow" of a Master who makes His way of love with a cross on His back. Nobody can do that casually.

#### Religious Articles and Old Bibles:

Several individuals have contacted the Parishes regarding what to do with religious articles and old Bibles that have been stored away for years. In some instances, inquiries have been made about the possibility of presenting/donating them to the Parishes. This is a non-starter, as the Parishes have more than their share of articles and are not prepared to accept more.

So, the question remains – what to do? According to our research, a common pious custom is to dispose of blessed objects by either burning them (if they are flammable) or burying them (if they are not). In the former case, the object is destroyed and the ashes (or other remains) can simply be thrown away. In the case of objects that were never blessed, they can simply be thrown away like any other non-blessed object.
